#### Have your say on our future

SGNZ is funded by a commodity levy, which growers voted for in 2020. All growers pay \$26 per 1,000 plants to fund our activities. Our Commodity Levies (Strawberries) Order 2020 ends on **31 March 2026.** 

**Every** grower has a vote on whether to continue to have a commodity levy. Any application for a new levy order must be supported in a referendum by over 50 % by value and 50% by number of those who vote.

The Minister who approves any referendum for a commodity levy expects that genuine effort has been made to consult with growers and **we are starting this process shortly.**

#### **Gene Editing Update**

HortNZ has submitted on behalf of the sector regarding this important legislation and will speak before the select committee shortly. There has been really limited time for consultation, and there is concern that the process is being too rushed.

HortNZ's position, which SGNZ supports, talks specifically to the horticulture risks. In a nutshell, it says the release of organisms bred using genetic technologies into the environment has potential benefits for primary industry. But there are also risks to ecosystems, biosecurity, market access and trade. The risks and benefits of such an environmental release will not be borne by the same groups, and therefore, it is important that the regulator is appropriately tasked (and resourced!) to assess and manage these risks and the trade-offs inherent in risk management. Just by-the-by, a shout-out to the policy team at HortNZ: the workload right now for changes in all kinds of regulation settings means that SGNZ members are getting great value for our affiliation. It's important to stand together to get a voice with government. If our sector can't advocate collectively for land, water, labour and environmentally sensible regulation, horticulture is destined to be 'taken out' by many interest groups.

#### Research and the BerryWorld Blog

Have you been reading BerryWorld's updates on issues and research we have underway? Some recent briefings have been on heat, the best planting times for plug plants and myrids. Molly's incredibly valuable blog (funded by SGNZ) is a mine of <u>information</u>.

There is rarely a definitive answer with our research. For example, 'catfacing' was thought to be a myriad issue, but apparently pollination is also a factor. In a current trial, a high level of catfacing early on was due to pollination troubles rather than myrids feeding. More research is needed - we don't know whether the pollination troubles are due to temperature extremes (either hot or cold), or lack of pollen movement.

### **Strawberry Exports**

We did not make the window for Vietnam this year. The process of finalising the OAP was finally signed off in October, much later than anticipated. We continue to progress this market and will keep you updated.

Meanwhile, for those who are interested in Vietnam, you will need to become an MAO - that is an MPI Approved Organisation for export. Becoming an MAO is a big project for any grower, so plan accordingly - please get in touch with Sally for further details.

In better news there has been good interest in Thailand, Taiwan and Dubai for the 25/26 season. Thailand is changing their biosecurity settings and this is a material risk to our exports - we are still working through options with MPI. It should not impact the 25/26 season however.

Round 5 Summary (10 February 2025)

#### **Strawberry Colour Scale Used**

- 1 = Good red colour
- 2 = 1-2 fruit with white/green shoulder
- **3** = 3 or more fruit with white/green shoulder
- 4 = Most fruit with white/green colour

#### **Strawberry Appearance Scale Used**

- 1 = Almost perfect
- 2 = 1 2 fruit with bruise/blemish
- 3 = 3 or more fruit with bruise/blemish
- 4 = Rots



#### Colour score av. 1.00

Good red colour

#### Appearance score av. 2.40

- 3 Wet bruising found
- Rots and Mould and Soft tips also noted



#### Brix

- Av. 7.95 (ranged from 5.3–15.1)
- 22% of berries had brix below 7 (4)
- 78% of berries had brix 7 or above (14)



#### Weights and Measures

- 100% samples with declared weight (6)
- · 1 sample had packed on date.
- Berry Count av. 18 (ranged from 15 23)



#### Sample Traceability

- 100% of samples traceable (6)
- · 6 different growers.
- 100% displayed Product of NZ



#### Average Price \$4.82

(equivalent to 250g)

- (Price Range \$3.99 \$5.99) for 250g

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# 2024 – 2025 Strawberry Mystery Shopping

Round 5 Summary (10 February 2025)



#### Microbial test results

- 2 samples tested
- Tested for E.coli, Faecal coliforms, Listeria, Salmonella, Staphylococcus.
- All samples were compliant.



#### Residue test results

- · 2 residue samples tested
- · All samples were compliant.



#### Strawberries were generally sold

- 67% Centre Display (4)
- 33% Side Chiller (2)



#### 18 Stores visited, 6 samples collected:

- All samples were purchased in Auckland.
- 4 Supermarket samples
- 2 Specialist store samples

#### Comments:

- Sampling was completed in Auckland on 10<sup>th</sup> February. All samples were North Island based growers; 4 Waikato, 1 Auckland and 1 Wellington grower.
- Sampling was also undertaken in Christchurch on 10<sup>th</sup> February. Several stores were visited but no samples collected as there were no new suppliers and only North Island product was available.
- In total, 7 Supermarkets, 8 Specialist stores and 3 Independent retailers were visited.
- In Auckland, 16 stores were visted and 6 samples were collected. 8 stores had no samples,
  3 stores had growers that were sampled in previous rounds.
- It is our observation that a small number of suppliers accounted for the fruit available in Supermarkets and Specialist stores.
